Personnel were unloaded from the
boat first - some of the luggage was in
w/hs - then it was decided to send the
rest of it later & we were taken to Jones-
town - it is 7 mi. to the control pt of the
mission

11^o as the pigs had to be taken off - they
had stood the trip well, w/the exception of

one which had been injured in the leg
& was not allowed by the others to get
on the feed !!

We were given a warm welcome by
our friends

Our luggage was assembled under a
green tent to be checked through by we
had take it - we were warned that
all this, mags & items for other people
must be turned over to Rita Lenin (Tupper).
